Her scarf stands for a type of dog that the fur is used for clothing and is no longer alive today. These monarch butterflies mean the king salmon is coming for the people to eat.




Her base stands for the people who come to the Hibulb Cultural Center, on it are busses and cars.



5. Tool Name: Crab pot net float




It is for catching fish.
